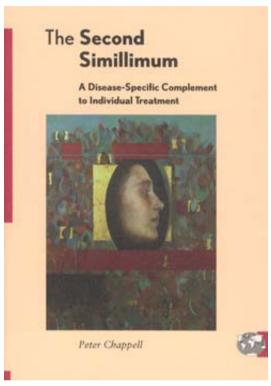

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Foreword

Of course the plague in the old days could do that too, but did we then have the capacity to know what was happening on the other side of the globe and almost immediately combine our efforts to cope with such conditions?

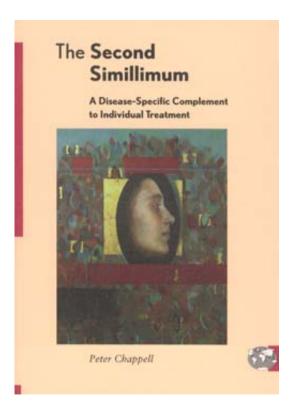
